

## Should I, or Shouldn't I? 30 questions to help you determine whether to engage in a conversation.

In this day and age, it's easy to cherry-pick Bible verses to suit our own desires and viewpoints. We are all guilty of it. So how do we ensure that when we have a conversation with someone (either in person or online), we are doing so in a healthy, biblical manner?

At the beginning of his ministry, Jesus taught us how to interact with God's Word. After fasting for 40 days and 40 nights, Jesus was quoted Scripture by none other than Satan himself. One could even argue that other than God, no one knows Scripture better than Satan, who like many in the world, quote Scripture to serve their own pride and passions. In response to Satan's schemes, Jesus looked at the whole Word of God and responded accordingly (Matthew 4:1-11).

When engaging in a conversation with someone, here is a list of questions to ask yourself before proceeding. This list isn't exhaustive, but it provides a good starting point for anyone that calls themself a Christian.

If, after reading a few questions, you come to the determination that you can't converse like this, then please consider taking the time to engage with your Bible more thoroughly. *If anyone keeps His word, the love of God has been truly perfected in him. By this we know that we are in Him: Whoever claims to abide in Him must walk as Jesus walked (1 John 2:5-6).* 

1. Does what I'm about to say embody loving my neighbor as myself? (Mark 12:31)


